The Texas Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Inspector General (OIG) Audit and Inspections Division (OIG Inspections) conducted an inspection to determine whether Villa Toscana at Cypress Woods (Villa Toscana) followed select state and federal requirements for emergency preparedness.

OIG Inspections conducted a site visit to Villa Toscana's facility and reviewed Villa Toscana's emergency preparedness plans and processes for compliance with 23 state and federal emergency preparedness requirements for nursing facilities. Based on the results of our testing, OIG Inspections determined that Villa Toscana's emergency preparedness plans and processes complied with the state and federal emergency preparedness requirements for nursing facilities reviewed as part of this inspection. As a result, no issues or opportunities for improvement were identified for this inspection.

Background

Villa Toscana, owned by South Limestone Hospital District and managed by Houston I Enterprises, LLC, is a skilled nursing facility located in Houston, Texas.

Section 1: Summary of Inspection Results

OIG Inspections conducted a site visit to Villa Toscana's facility on May 24, 2022, and reviewed Villa Toscana's emergency preparedness plans and processes for compliance with 23 state and federal emergency preparedness requirements for nursing facilities related to:

- Emergency preparedness plans
- Emergency supplies and power
- Emergency communication plans
- Emergency preparedness plan training and testing

Villa Toscana had both printed and online versions of an updated emergency preparedness (a) plan, (b) communication plan, and (c) training and testing program. The availability of emergency preparedness documents in both printed and online forms should improve access to the information in an emergency and offers an electronic platform for reviewing and updating all elements within the plan. Villa Toscana also had updated procedures related to alternative power sources; subsistence needs for residents and staff; and documentation for past trainings and tests.

Additionally, during OIG Inspection's on-site visit to Villa Toscana's facility, inspectors saw multiple emergency preparedness elements, including a generator used as an alternate energy source and supplies for resident and staff subsistence. Villa Toscana's emergency preparedness plans and processes complied with the state and federal emergency preparedness requirements for nursing facilities reviewed as part of this inspection. OIG Inspections did not identify any issues or opportunities for improvement.

OIG Inspections thanks the management and staff at Villa Toscana for their cooperation and assistance during this inspection.

Emergency Preparedness Requirements

Nursing facilities are required to establish and maintain an emergency preparedness program, ^{1,2} which includes, but is not limited to, the following emergency preparedness elements:

- Emergency preparedness plan
- Policies and procedures
- Communication plan
- Training and testing program
- Emergency and standby power systems

Each nursing facility's emergency preparedness plan must address emergency events identified by the facility's risk assessment, such as heating or cooling system failures, fires, power outages, extreme winter conditions, hurricanes, and tornadoes.

HHS Long Term Care Regulation (LTCR) is responsible for ensuring nursing facilities comply with state and federal laws and regulations. LTCR provides training and guidance, conducts annual emergency preparedness surveys, and performs a follow-up review of deficiencies identified to ensure compliance.

Section 2: Objective, Scope, Methodology, Standards, and Criteria

Objective and Scope

The inspection objective was to determine whether Villa Toscana followed select state and federal requirements for emergency preparedness.

The inspection scope included Villa Toscana's (a) documentation of calendar year 2021 emergency preparedness training and testing and (b) emergency preparedness program in place as of May 2022.

Methodology

To achieve its inspection objective, OIG Inspections collected information through (a) discussions and interviews with LTCR staff and Villa Toscana staff, (b) a site visit to Villa Toscana's facility in Houston, Texas, on May 24, 2022, and (c) a review of:

- Regulations, policies, and procedures that address the objective.
- Villa Toscana's emergency preparedness plan, emergency supplies and power, communication plan, and training and testing records.

OIG Inspections selected the emergency preparedness requirements to test as part of this inspection after (a) discussions with LTCR and (b) review of prior deficiencies identified in both LTCR reviews and the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General's review of selected nursing facilities in Texas to evaluate compliance with life safety and emergency preparedness requirements.³

In March 2022, there were 1,154 nursing facilities participating in Texas Medicaid. To choose the nursing facility to inspect, OIG Inspections considered the following criteria:

- Location of the nursing facility.
- Date LTCR last inspected the nursing facility.
- Nursing facility incidents reported to HHS.

Standards
